


Teacher Externships



Montana Teachers Experience Industry First-Hand

Teacher externships offer hands-on knowledge outside of the classroom.

Students from across the state will learn from their teachers' experiences about the work that takes place in Montana's businesses.

Teachers will:

- Participate in three day externships.
- Share lessons learned with fellow educators.
- Present what they have learned at various education conferences
- Earn continuing education credits and a \$600 stipend upon completion.

Applications open in January and close early March to allow for matching.






Work That Matters

Work-based learning (WBL) is a key component of career-connected learning. While career-connected learning includes career awareness and exploration, work-based learning is experiential, on-the-job learning.

In addition to building employability skills, WBL experiences help students develop meaning from their classroom learning and explore purposeful career opportunities. The Montana Work-Based Learning Collaborative works to promote belonging, meaning, well-being, and purpose for all young Montanans by building capacity for high-quality WBL experiences. Employers who intentionally cultivate belonging in the workplace for young workers benefit from access to future workforce talent.

We work to improve coordination among the K-12 education system, post-secondary education system, public workforce system, and government agencies to benefit Montana's emerging workforce and Montana's businesses.
